Let's move on to the critical question: can we think of the iPad as a real computer? Should your next machine be an iPad instead of a netbook or even a full notebook?


You need to navigate that question cautiously. The iPad is something new. It isn't "a notebook without a keyboard." It's an iPad.

Yes, It's A Real Computer

After a week with the iPad, I'm convinced that it can do damned near anything I'd use a notebook for. I'm leaving tomorrow for a few days in New York and I plan on leaving my notebook behind. I'm using the iPad as my sole computer. A breakdown of my typical travel needs tells the tale:

I used to keep up with news and mail while I'm gone. That's covered by the iPad's Mail and Safari apps. Mail isn't as powerful as most business-class mail clients (no automatic "rules"-based mail processing, no templates, no keyboard shortcuts ... and the app can only load 200 messages at a time before going back to the server for more). But it supports multiple accounts ... and I love the touch-based interface. The "steering wheel" until common to many iPad apps allows me to flick through a few hundred emails and send out any

never know, on the basis of actual observations. Light has a finite speed (1 light-year per year, or 300,000 kilometers per second), and there is only a finite time since the Big Bang. 

Bermuda

Bermuda (pronounced /bərˈmjuːdə/; officially, the **Bermuda Islands** or the **Somers Isles**) is a British overseas territory in the North Atlantic Ocean. Located off the east coast of the United States, its nearest landmass is Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, about 1,030 kilometres (640 mi) to the west-northwest. It is about 1,350 km (840 mi) south of Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, and 1,770 km (1,100 mi) northeast of Miami, Florida. Its capital city is Hamilton.

Bermuda is the oldest and most populous remaining British overseas territory, settled by England a century before the Acts of Union created the Kingdom of Great Britain. Bermuda's first capital, St George's, was settled in 1612 and is the oldest continuously inhabited English town in the Americas.

Bermuda has a very affluent economy, with finance as its largest sector followed by tourism, giving it the world's highest GDP per capita in 2005. It has a subtropical climate.


