reputation that some of the newer, sunbelt cities enjoyed in terms of quality of life. 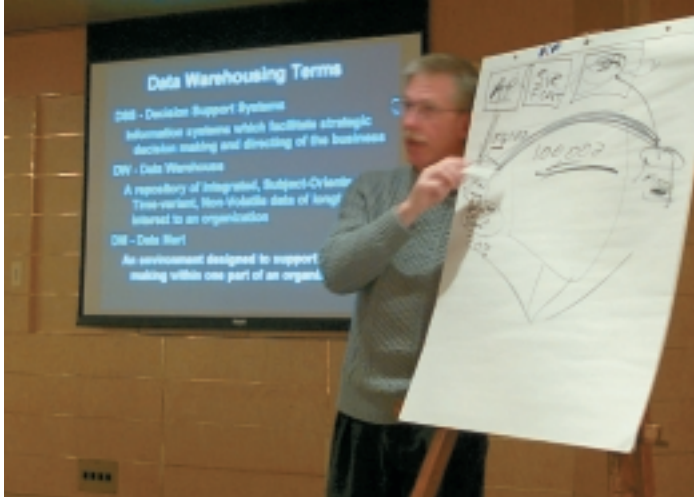
